## UCI professor awarded \$2.2 million for continued research

Dr. Eric Rignot will expand his aerial glacier research mapping with funding from the Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation.

<u>UCI Earth System Science</u> department professor <u>Eric Rignot</u> has been awarded \$2.2 million by the <u>Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation</u>, which helps advance conservation and scientific research worldwide, to expand his aerial glacier mapping to the Patagonian Ice Fields of Chile and the frozen fjords of West Greenland.

"We are very excited to have received this vital funding from the prestigious Moore Foundation," said Rignot. He believes the advanced helicopter survey work "will provide critical data to improve our understanding and predictability of how glacial ice contributes to sea level rise in a warming climate."

Centro de Estudios Científicos in Chile and Sander Geophysics in Canada will partner with Rignot in the three-year project.
